

Attendance and punctuality are extremely important- we want to be able to start the tests as soon as possible once the children arrive. All children must attend each day.

To support your child and ensure they have a good start to the day, we ask that all year 6 children arrive between 8:30 and 8:45 am.

#### **Y1 Phonics Check**

The phonics screening check will be administered during the week beginning the 9<sup>th</sup> June. Children will be reading 40 words. 20 real words and 20 'alien' words. To prepare for this, please read with your children as much as possible and encourage them to use their Read Write Inc techniques 'Special Friends, Fred Talk, Read the Word.' Class teachers will be able to tell you if there are any sounds your child needs support with.



## **Maths**

Maths at both schools continues to flourish and our Times Tables Rock Stars battle is coming to an end, the children have been incredibly engaged with the competition and it has been a tight competition and it has come down to the wire between Squirrels class of Donington and Badgers class of St Gilberts. Keep an eye out on Times Tables Rock Stars for any other competitions that may begin.



## Music

Our key stage one and key stage two choir both came together to put on an amazing recital to help raise money for Red Nose day on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> March. 















Children from Year 1 and 2 had an amazing trip to Lincoln Castle to coincide with their topic for this term: 'Castles, Crowns and Coronations' in which they have been learning about the royals and how they controlled their kingdoms throughout history. The sun shone as the children got to walk around the walls of the castle, taking in the amazing sights and understanding from the tour guide about the fascinating history of the castle. Later, they tried on armour, helmets and shields so they could experience what it was like being a knight and they even had a go firing a bow and arrow. To finish off the trip, they got to make their very own shields and have a banquet with the children dressing up as Kings, Queens, Lords, Ladies and even the Master of Hounds! It was a fantastic day and was described as 'The best day ever!'









Children from Year 5 and 6 had a fantastic trip to Duxford Imperial War Museum to reinforce their learning around our history topic: 'Goodnight Mr Tom', which focuses on World War II. Children explored the different hangars and got to see lots of different vehicles from World War II including Spitfires, Hurricanes, submarines and tanks. We were also incredibly lucky to see a Spitfire take off on the airfield runway. A favourite experience of the trip was seeing a reconstruction of a real operations room. Children were fascinated to learn about the different things that were dropped and used by parachute regiments – even dogs!







Earlier this half-term, children in Year 6 had the amazing opportunity to visit the Houses of Parliament. We started off the day when were dropped off at Buckingham Palace – we just managed to see the Royal Guard and horses through the rain! When we arrived at Parliament, we started with a tour and saw the Palace of Westminster as well as the House of Commons and House of Lords. Children were very interested to see part of a live debate in the House of Commons. We learned more about the different parts of Parliament including how laws are made in our workshop. Before we left, we even got the chance to meet our local MP and ask him questions about his job and our community.
